A detailed description of how much nachas your child is giving you due to the Rebbi's hard work is worth far more to me than a \$100 bill in an envelope, with a "dry" note "Happy Chanuka".

True, a Rebbi should teach Lishmah, just for Hashem's sake, but it does not take off the responsibility from the parents to thank the Rebbi from time to time.

Does Hashem NEED our praises? Yet, when we say Halell to Hashem, it brings down a flow from Hashem to this world.

Likewise, when a Rebbi is praised for his hard work, he is motivated – and **WHO DOESN'T WANT A MOTIVATED REBBI FOR HIS CHILD?**
